## 2-day oro-dental check-up, treatment camp concludes at KU

**Srinagar, June 27:** A two-day oro-dental check-up and treatment camp organised by the Kashmir University Health Centre in collaboration with the Department of Public Dentistry, Government Dental College, Srinagar concluded here Thursday.
