Training Programme on 'Education in Disasters and Emergencies' concludes at KU



Srinagar, Nov 29: A five-day training programme on 'Education in Disasters and Emergencies' organized by the Department of Social Work, University of Kashmir (KU), concluded here on Friday.

The event was held in collaboration with the National Institute of Disaster Management (NIDM), Ministry of Home Affairs, Govt. of India.

The programme was aimed at equipping school teachers with the essential skills in disaster management and enhance their ability to respond effectively and protect the precious lives of students in times of disasters.

A total of 46 teachers from both government and private schools across all districts of the region were trained during the five-day program. Faculty from NIDM and Bal Raksha Bharat (NGO) conducted sessions on various aspects of disaster management.

They must be prepared to mitigate risks during disasters and this training is an important step in that direction," he said.

SSP Commandment SDRF (JKPS), Mansoor Ahmad Mir, highlighted the vulnerability of children during disasters and the importance of providing them safety.

"This training develop the necessary skills and networks for disaster management planning and ensures the safety of children at school," he stated.

"Teachers are often the first to build vision in children's lives and they can play a critical role during emergencies in schools. It's essential to have SOPs and a disaster management plan in place to ensure children's physical, mental, and social safety," he noted.

Senior Programme Manager, NIDM, Dr. Kumar Raka, stressed on the importance of focusing on children's needs.

Earlier, in her welcome address, Head, Department of Social Work, Prof. Shazia Manzoor highlighted the importance of training programme on disaster management for educators.
